

CROSSREACH

Care you can put your faith in

If you have ever gone through for tea/ coffee and a fine piece after the Sunday service you may have noticed some posters on the wall about things that are happening with Crossreach.

Surprisingly not many ordinary members of congregations know or recognise that Crossreach is the Social care arm of the Church of Scotland. What that means is that they provide services for the young as well as for the elderly, literally from the cradle to the grave. Crossreach is the largest provider of social care services in Scotland ... next only to the government.

No, they are not completely funded by The Church of Scotland for all that they provide. Indeed the C of S provides a very small portion of funding. Crossreach recovers most of their costs from Local Authoritie by providing, for example, children's homes, care in the community and elderly persons' services and all to the very highest standards. They also depend on legacies and self funders in Care homes for the elderly.

We are very fortunate to have in this area one of the very best care homes for the elderly. Can you guess?

It opened in the year when Shirley Bassey was born and the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco was officially opened. It was of course 1937 and on October 27th of that year Balmedie House was opened by the R. H. Lord Polwarth with the express purpose that "it would become a place where lonely people are cared for". Initially there was accommodation for 35 residents sleeping in dormitories. The house used 10 tons of coal a month to keep it warm.

Over the ensuing years there have been a number of major renovations, the latest in 2006 when 32 en-suite bedrooms were created and a new wing also opened. No more dormitories or coal fires!

The level of care and support have also increased, and staff are qualified professionals who work to the highest standards as demonstrated by the top grades of 6 across all areas by the Care Inspectorate. Much has also stayed the same, the glorious views from the house and the distant sound of the sea.

Anne Reid, Service Manager at Balmedie House for 6 years says "The practical out working of Christian care and compassion continues through the commitment of everyone who works there".

You have probably already twigged that last October 27th Balmedie House celebrated its 80th birthday, and though I share the same birthday I am quite a few years younger, thank you!

Like all Octogenarians they started celebrating early. In August they had a family BBQ, balloons, cakes and dancing on the lawn to the music of a visiting entertainer. On the actual birthday, 27th October 2017, the day began with a thanksgiving service then a three course meal, cake and

refreshments followed by dancing and singing until late in the evening.

There were many happy memories enjoyed both by the residents and staff. So next time you are through for a cuppa after our services, spare a moment to glance at the notices on the walls in the hall and delight in knowing that Crossreach is the very successful care arm of The Church of Scotland.

Joint BBQ with West Church ...




On Sunday, 27th



Many of us will remember or have heard of the famous visit of Billy Graham to the northeast in 1955, but how many know about the visit to Huntly in 1874 of Moody and Sankey, the superstars of evangelism in those days? In celebration of their visit, Noth Parish Church, The Square, Rhynie, intends to hold an evening of song and history, at 6.30pm on Sunday 9th September.

Local historian, Patrick Scott, will recall the arrival in Huntly of the two famous American evangelists, Dwight Moody and Ira Sankey on Monday 29th June 1874.

For several days before the 29th, crowds had been arriving in Huntly so that when the great day arrived, about 20,000 people packed the Show Park opposite the castle in order to hear the charismatic preacher Dwight Moody and the fine baritone singing voice of Ira Sankey.

In the evening, a service was held in Huntly Parish Church with all of the 1,800 seats filled whilst others crammed the aisles. It was reported that never before was the Gospel message listened to with such attention and enthusiasm. Mr. Slorach, the local tailor, said: "I've never heard the Wird preached sae weel and it'll bide in my thochts iver mair!"

All are invited to come and hear their story, and enjoy some of their famous hymns, and if you think you do not know their music then go along to Rhynie and be prepared to be surprised, entertained and up-lifted.
