Difficult Times

It's been said that it's just as well that we don't know what the future has in store for us. As I was inducted as your minister on 30th January, there was no way I could know that, six weeks later, the Church of Scotland would suspend meeting for worship across the country for the foreseeable future. Yet that is exactly what has happened as we adapt to the challenges presented by the coronavirus.

This is a worrying time for everyone and not just for our health. Many are faced with the prospect of financial difficulties as businesses struggle to cope, working hours are reduced, or lost entirely, and children need to be cared for during weekdays because the schools are closed. Carefully made plans by government, business and individuals have been thrown into turmoil, and the risks of loneliness are multiplied as theatres, cinemas, sports facilities, etc. close and we practise social distancing to reduce opportunities for the virus to spread. Even essential supplies are becoming difficult to obtain as people stockpile items in preparation for a potential period of quarantine. Please join me in remembering all these issues in your prayers.

But all is not doom and gloom, difficult times can also bring out the best in people as we all find ways to adapt to the 'new normal'. It may not be possible for us to meet physically in church, but we can still worship together in spirit. On St. Andrew's church website, you would normally find a recording of the last Sunday service. Until the church is able to re-open you will, instead, find a sort of 'mini-service' with prayers, readings, a reflection/sermon and a blessing. Everything you would normally expect on a Sunday except singing; I would not be so cruel as to inflict my singing on you!!! As you listen, I hope that you will feel something of the togetherness we experience on a normal Sunday, both togetherness with your fellow worshippers and a closer connection with The Lord:

"For I, the LORD your God, hold your right hand; it is I who say to you, "Do not fear, I will help you."" (Isaiah 41:13)

Finally, Diane and Kit are determined to keep 'The Saltire' going to help you stay in touch with church matters during this period of closure, many thanks to them and all who help in its delivery. Difficult times may well bring out the best in us, but we are lucky to have people who are always prepared to do what they can for our church community.

NEWS FROM THE CALCULATOR

2019 proved to an exciting year for St. Andrew's seeing our debts eradicated and renewed focus on growing our financial wellbeing.

On 11 March 2020, our 2019 Annual Report and Accounts were approved, signed off and submitted to Presbytery of Gordon well ahead of the deadline.

So where did we end up? At last we ended the year with a surplus of income compared with expenditure. To give you the very latest 29 February 2020 position, here is where we are right now:-

As many of you will be aware, the very welcome induction of Rev. Carl Irvine as our Minister brings with it a number of additional financial obligations together with an increased contribution for Ministry and Mission. Collectively the 2020 Budget forecasts that we will have a reduced level of income in the order of £20,000 for which monies are set aside to avoid falling into debt. In addition, we have a retention policy which the Board have continue to set at 4 months of projected monthly expenditure thus a set aside of £40,000 to ensure we can meet all our ongoing financial obligations.

In 2019 the Board also approved refurbishment of the New Hall toilets which will be undertaken during the Easter break. The cost of this is £4,900 however we have set aside £5,000 "just in case". No other projects are under discussion and indeed the Property Convener and Team are charged with developing a detailed inventory of potential projects for future consideration in formulating a 5-10 plan forward and of course fundraising which may be necessary.

We have also been finally able to track down three designated funds which have been sat dormant for many years. These funds account for some £5,350 and steps are being taken this year to finally close these and move the monies into the general account for broader use of our church. A further revelation was the discovery of an investment fund which the Board have agreed we can close down and make the proceeds available for use by the church. So, whilst looking at only the bank accounts we have £85,200, but after all the current set asides we only have £14,800 to meet those rainy-day events which will inevitably continue to occur.

One of our significant income streams is from use of our premises, an income that has seen steady decline since 2017. We have been very fortunate in being able to appoint a Lettings Convener (Kit Pawson) and a team who have taken up the challenge of trying to arrest any further decline and hopefully generate an increase no matter how modest. None of our circumstances is cause for any doom, gloom or despondency. We are a strong church in time, talents and money. We must continue to harness those going forward to ensure we remain in a strong position.

From the entire Finance Team, our grateful thanks to all our members and anonymous donors who continue to give so freely.

SEWING FOR HOPE James 1:27 Psalm 82:3



This project is one run by the Christian charity, TUMAINI, which means hope in Swahili. This charity was started by Aberdeen GP Dr Susan Wilson in 2003, after visiting Kagera in Northern Tanzania. There are around 100,000 orphans and many widows in this area as a result of AIDS. Tumaini is helping 25,000 of them with education, housing, trauma counselling, training in carpentry or tailoring.

Sewing for Hope Groups make washable sanitary kits so that girls do not miss out on 180 days of school. In a drawstring bag they have a sewing kit, pads, shields, soap, a washcloth and a pouch, to enable them to attend school even when they have their monthly periods.

The Inverurie Sewing for Hope group began in Autumn 2018 as a result of two events that summer: a visit by two friends, Fatima from Syria and Patricia from Scotland to Kildrummy Castle Gardens Museum, where there was an old Singer sewing machine, which Fatima was desperate to try out! and a visit to a Tumaini stall at Keswick at Buckie convention, where the project was explained. The thread of the story began and so in September a small group of New Scots and Old Scots (sorry ladies!) visited the Aberdeen Group and learned how to make the drawstring bags; the sewing kits and then eventually the pads.

Since then once a month on a Sunday afternoon around 8-12 ladies meet to sew by hand or machine, fold, iron, make up sewing kits together. We were privileged to star on Bloomberg news when a journalist and her photographer were in the area and wanted to share the good news of Muslim and Christian women involved in a project for Muslim and Christian girls in Africa. We have had the opportunity to share our story with guilds, Trefoil Guild and a rural so far and this has encouraged ladies to become involved in different ways. We have had kind donations of money and cotton and ran a coffee am to raise funds (another to follow sometime!) for the wincyette and special waterproof materials. Sewing machines have also been donated and refurbished by Stephen in Aberdeen Sewing Machines for our New Scots friends, who can be involved in the project in Inverurie, as well as for those who can sew in Westhill. We are very grateful for buttons, needles, safety pins, apron tape and thread to help us along, which our friends in the charity shops are always on the look out for! INVERURIE PRACTICAL CHRISTIAN OUTREACH GROUP (Starter packs)

Dear Sir/Madam

We originated as an Outreach Group at St Andrew's Church, Inverurie in January 2001 and are now largely based at the West Church in Inverurie. Our aim is to provide starter packs to previously homeless persons who are being rehoused in the local area and we provide double and single bedding packs, single and family kitchen packs, cleaning packs, crockery packs and cutlery packs to help them settle into their new accommodation. These packs are distributed throughout Gordon District in conjunction with the Housing Department at Aberdeenshire Council and over the years we have provided hundreds of packs due to the high demand for them.

However, membership of the group has fallen to four and we are finding fundraising increasingly challenging. Over the years we have tried unsuccessfully to recruit new members to join the group with limited success. In order to continue to provide this important service, we are looking to find new ways to provide the packs and are hoping that individual churches with Gordon presbytery might be willing to help by 'adopting' a pack and delivering them directly to the Aberdeenshire Council on a regular basis.

We would be grateful if you could identify a person/persons within your congregation/s who might be interested in this outreach project and ask them to contact any of the under-noted group members for further information.
