Our Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

One of my very early memories was, very nearly, also my last. When I was three years old, my second eldest sister, and my elder brother, who were eight and nine, took me for a walk to the beach, near our house, where they became engrossed playing in the sand. I wandered off, taking a long walk on a short pier. When I close my eyes and think about this event, I still clearly see the green of the water

all around me contrasting with the green of my little, double-breasted, wool coat with its brown buttons which, little did I realise, was pulling me down. I am only able to relate this story now because, at the crucial moment, my eldest sister happened along and saw me go off the end of the pier. She immediately jumped in, rescued me and carried me home, where mum gave us both a warm bath and hot cocoa. Why have I told you this? Well, even though this happened fifty-five years ago, I can still remember certain details, especially the colour of the water around me, as if it happened only yesterday – that's the funny thing about time! We can remember certain events from many years ago but struggle to remember what we did last week. The beginning of lockdown has receded into the depths of my memory, it's almost as if my watery excursion as a three year old happened during my permitted exercise time out of the house: two-and-a-half months ago is less clear in my mind than fifty-five years ago!

Similarly, at times an hour can seem to last forever while, at other times, it passes in a flash! Last night we had a family quiz, using the wonders of modern technology to bring us all together. The quiz, and associated chat, lasted about ninety minutes and seemed to go by in a flash, but the twenty minutes I spent queueing to get into the supermarket the day before seemed to go on for hours!

Time is, indeed, a funny thing, psychologists have all sorts of complex explanations to explain why we experience these differences in our perception of time which, in a nutshell, boil down to:


Time seems to pass more quickly when you are busy. Significant memories tend to be clearer, even many years later.

Turning to Scripture, in his second letter, the Apostle Peter wrote, "with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day" (2 Peter:3:8b). Although Peter was specifically writing here to those who wondered why the Second Coming was not happening, the point he made about time is pertinent. God is outside time, He created it, it has no hold on Him. We, on the other hand are subject to time and, during lockdown, we become all too aware of time passing. But that does not mean that we should let time go by aimlessly. As the old saying goes, 'Every cloud has a silver lining.'

In the cloud of lockdown, what silver lining can you find? For me, I have, among other things, had time to try out new recipes (cooking is one of my hobbies), read more and, through the Church Website and Facebook Page, I have reached a wider audience with God's Word than normally come to church on a Sunday morning. Paul also wrote, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) So, what's your silver lining?

Creator God,

When we look around at the world You created for us to wander on, and the universe for us to wonder about, we are astounded by the enormous variety of its components, both living and non-living, and by the subtleties of how they all work together in an infinite variety of dependence and inter-dependence.



But we tend to concentrate our wonder on what we can see, with or without the benefit of technology. Yet something we cannot see, only experience, is equally as astounding: Time!

Lord, we know that, because You created time, You are not subject to it. As Your Apostle Paul wrote, to You "one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day". But we also know that, in Jesus, You became one of us, experiencing time as we do. In Him, You allowed Yourself to grow from the Babe of Bethlehem, becoming the Boy in the Temple, then the Teacher on the Mount and the Worker of Miracles, before submitting Yourself to become the Sacrificial Lamb Who saves the whole world. Lord, we thank You.

Father God, as we have become more aware of the passing of time in lock-down, as we have noticed its speed seeming to vary, depending on what we do, as we remember events from our early days much more clearly than those of a month or two in the past, help us to appreciate that You are with us for all time. You are with us in our times of joy and our times of sorrow. You are with us in our successes and our failures. You were with us when we were born and will be with us when we die. Help us also to use the time You have given us wisely, learning more about You, being more obedient to You and serving You more faithfully.

Thank You, Father, for Your constant presence, Your unceasing guidance and Your eternal love. Amen

Micawber Here!!

"Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen pounds and six pence, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds ought and six, result misery."

As many of you recall we entered 2020 in a financially strong position ("result happiness") and I was looking forward to our Annual Stated meeting usually held in March. Unfortunately, COVID-19 arrived and with it lockdown of everything including our Church, mass

cancellation of hall lettings (a major income stream) and reduction in receipt of Givings until collection becomes possible. Our grateful thanks to everyone who has found a way to keep their financial contributions coming in.

We still have significant expenditures despite the circumstances, not least of which are Mission and Ministry £5,588.19 (this includes, for example, minister's stipend; contribution for upkeep of central office and staff; costs of Mission outreach and World Mission); £333.27 for council tax and £437.96 for insurances; above this we have heating and lighting, running costs (even though we have the buildings in hibernation mode). The impact has been a reduction on our Reserves Fund from £40,000 to £22,000 (end April) and which is likely to reduce further the longer the lockdown exists. I took the opportunity, on your behalf, to express our concerns to the General Trustees that whilst we can "pay our way" in 2020 by careful management of our funds, 2021 onwards will be a challenge (a view shared by the Trustees at their meeting on 4 May 2020).

So what have we been able to do to mitigate/avoid "result misery":-

- Linsey is working from home with short duration visits to the Church to collect correspondence and invoices, banking or monies received;
- Agnes remains on furlough in respect of which our HMRC claim for 80% of her salary was promptly dealt with. We will continue to make further claims through the furlough period (now extended to October 2020 as of 12 May 2020) or until we can open our Church, whichever comes first;
- On 4 May 2020 we applied for a Grant under the Government Third Sector Resilience Fund. Unfortunately, our application was rejected as other applicants demonstrated a more urgent need for financial assistance. This does not preclude St Andrew's reapplying later;
- On 4 May 2020 we applied for a Grant under the Government Third Sector Resilience Fund. This takes up to 10 days for processing

• With digging and input from Alastair Smith, Vera Binnie and Elaine Roebuck (our very own Miss Marple) we have been able to identify areas of Gift Aided donations for which tax recovery has not previously been claimed. Thanks to everyone as it will help increase our income by about £950 in the June 2020 tax claim.

Like Micawber, St. Andrew's remains "result happiness" albeit a daily challenge managing our funds and keeping abreast of developments. It is appropriate to give thanks to those good folks in "121" who, even though working from home, provide us with regular updates which can be found at https://www.churchofscotland.org.uk/resources/covid-19-coronavirus-advice (my morning reading) and the email "chats" and guidance I receive from them in particular David Stilher (Legal), Allan Simpson (Data Protection), IT Department and all the backroom staff who always have time for St. Andrew's and go out of their way to help and guide us.

Of personal interest to you all, online criminality is rife and recommend you take a few minutes to read the latest updates to ensure you remain as safe as possible https://www.churchofscotland.org.uk/resources/covid-19-coronavirus-advice/phishing-emails-and-scams.

Whilst we continue to work from home, if you have any questions then please do not hesitate to contact either myself or Linsey, if we don't have an answer, we probably know someone who does.

On a personal note and after consultation with the Moderator (also know as The Rev/Her Indoors) I offered to stay as Treasurer until 31 December 2021 given the prevailing disruption and desire to avoid more hiatus in St. Andrew's. That offer was accepted however when we do return to normality, we still need to develop a succession strategy and plan.

Take good care, stay safe and keep well.

To quote a phrase first used in 1860 in the coat of arms of New Westminster, Canada, "In God We Trust" - "result happiness".





Hello from Inverurie Boys' Brigade we hope everybody



National Trust ... The

National Trust is going to get rid of its plastic membership cards. Replacing the five million membership cards with a paper alternative will save 12.5 tons of plastic each year. The new cards will be made from a strong and durable paper, with a water-based coating. The cards will be recyclable and compostable.

The National Trust also has plans to almost completely remove single-use plastics from its sites by 2022. It has already replaced all disposable food packaging with compostable products. Next, it wants to remove plastic drinks bottles and eliminate plastic packaging from its shops.

Keep an eye out for the elderly ...

When did you last see your elderly neighbour? Seriously: are they okay?

During this time of social distancing, it is all too easy to assume that the elderly person you never see is simply safe indoors. But are they?

Isolation can be dangerous: it is too easy for them to have had an accident and be unable to call for help.

Why not arrange a system with them whereby you agree that you will give them a quick ring once a day, or even stand outside their house and wave? It only takes a few seconds to make sure they are still on their feet, and that all is well.

If you have several elderly neighbours, why not ask a few of your local friends to help you keep in brief touch with them each day?
