Our Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

November is the month of Remembrance and many people choose to wear a poppy, but did you know that there are four different colours of Remembrance poppy?

Red Poppy

The original colour of poppy is, of course, red. I am sure you know that this is because the red poppies, blooming in the muddy wastelands of WW1 battlefields, were one of the first signs of life returning

to a place of carnage and death, and were the inspiration for John McCrae's famous poem,

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row..."

On their website, the Royal British Legion explain; "The poppy is a symbol of Remembrance and hope for a peaceful future. Wearing one is a show of support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterans and their families. It represents all those who lost their lives on active service in all conflicts: from the beginning of the First World War right up to the present day."

White Poppy

The white poppy is produced by the Peace Pledge Union, whose Campaigns Manager, Symon Hill, wrote "White poppies are not a generic peace symbol. Nor are they a protest against Remembrance. Quite the opposite: they are a symbol of remembrance for people who have died or suffered in war. That's why we wear them on Remembrance Day. White poppies also represent a commitment to peace. This follows from remembering the horrors of war. We never say red poppies glorify war – we know many red poppy wearers share many of our values."

Black Poppy

On the Black Poppy Rose organisation website, we can read that the black poppy was: "Created to be a symbol that represents the contributions made by the African/Black/ Caribbean/Pacific Islands communities to various wars since the 16th century." It goes on to explain the black poppy is "A symbol that signifies pride, honour and glory, with the hope that future generations will be inspired by these largely untold historical legacies."

Purple Poppy

The purple poppy is worn to remember all the animals killed in war. The money it raises goes specifically to animal charities.

Wearing a poppy is, of course, a matter for personal choice. If you do choose to wear a poppy of whatever colour, wear it with pride but, please, respect those who choose differently.

Almighty God.

We pray today for those whose lives are blighted by war, both wars of the past and wars of the present. We give thanks for those who have defended just causes, especially those who paid the ultimate price. For those haunted by experiences of war, and for those who have lost loved ones, we ask for Your peace to be upon them and comfort them.

As we take time, this month, to remember those who have fought and died in war, help us to learn its lessons. Teach us to recognise that all people, of all colours, all beliefs and all nations, are created in Your image. Open our eyes to see Your image in all whom we meet. When we disagree, help us to disagree with respect and lead us away from conflict on the path of compromise.

Father, we look forward to a time when there is no more war. A time when 'swords are beaten into ploughshares and spears into pruning hooks'. A time when the precious resources of Your creation are used for peaceful purposes and not turned into instruments of death. A time when Your Son will rule as The Prince of Peace.

We Will Remember –

80 years on ... This year we've been remembering the Battle of Britain, described by Winston Churchill in August 1940 as *'one of the decisive battles of the war... never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few.'* It was a dramatic turning point in the history of the Second World War. The occasions for Remembrance this month will provide us with times of gratitude for what was achieved in the darkest moments of war. However, this year we are very aware of our own struggles with the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic. We face an unseen enemy, but the effects on our lives and society are almost as dev-

astating as world war. Remembering is not just about focusing on past events. It is also about making present past events, as we give thanks for all that took place.

The Battle of Britain was fought by the Few and won in the skies over the Channel. In our battle with the virus, we can call to mind the victory of Jesus: *'Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, descended from David.'* (2 Timothy 2:8). Jesus secured the victory of death by His cross and resurrection, so that we don't need to fear death, but trust in His loving purposes for our lives. Currently we can't see clearly what the future holds for us; it may be very different from what we might expect. However, we can pray for God's will to be done and that we will play our part, just as each of those airmen did so many years ago.

'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'





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News from the combined Congregational Board/Kirk Session

Meeting held on Wednesday,14th October 2020 at 7.00 pm, via a Microsoft Teams Video conference:

Key Points:

- We still urgently require to appoint a new Treasurer. We are also looking for a new Fabric Convenor. Anyone interested in either of these two very important roles is asked to contact the Church Office for more details.
- A detailed discussion took place on the procedures that have been put in place for reopening the church building for Sunday morning worship. The procedures are in place to ensure we keep a safe distance and to maintain a one way system as required by Government guidelines. The stewards on duty will try to explain the system as we enter the building. We are asked to be patient and to be aware that we are one of the very first Churches that have had the resources available to put a safe system in place and be brave enough to open for worship.
- The Presbytery Questionnaire on church buildings was discussed and it was determined that our buildings were in a good place with well equipped spaces.
- It was agreed that the Foodbank trolley should be reintroduced for donations in the vestibule of the church.
- It was agreed that fresh flowers should not be used in the church building at this time as they cannot be distributed to members of the congregation. We are however grateful to Eileen Robertson and her Team for the beautiful silk flowers and harvest decoration.
- Members were reminded that the Office Administrator is very busy so please try and keep visits to the office to those that are necessary and complete the business as quickly as possible. **The office is open Monday to Friday from 09:30 to 11:30 am.**

Poppy Appeal 2020 ... Look out for the Poppy Appeal again this year, but not so much via street collections. Instead, the Royal British Legion will focus on contactless donations, as a safer way forward during the pandemic. One such method will be 'point of sale donations'. This means that when you shop at your supermarket and reach the till or online, you may be invited to round up your total to the nearest pound to help the Poppy Appeal.

A spokesman for the Royal British Legion said: "The Poppy Appeal 2020 is very much still going ahead", but that "the safety and wellbeing of our volunteers, staff and members is paramount. This means that collectors who fall into the vulnerable category have been advised "not to take part in activity on behalf of the Poppy Appeal that would expose them to any additional risks while coronavirus is still present." And yet the need is still huge: "Members of the Armed Forces Community are suffering significant hardship as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak and we at the Royal British Legion will do everything we possibly can to support them." **The Story of the Poppy** ... In the Spring of 1915, shortly after losing a friend in Ypres, a Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae was inspired by the sight of poppies growing in battle-scarred fields to write a now famous poem called "In Flanders' Fields". After the First World War, the poppy was adopted as a symbol of Remembrance.



In Flanders' Fields

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders' Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die. We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' Fields.

McCrae's poem inspired an American academic, Moina Michael, to make and sell red silk poppies which were brought to England by a French woman, Anna Guerin. The (Royal) British Legion, formed in 1921, ordered 9 million of these poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. The poppies sold out almost immediately and that first ever "Poppy Appeal" raised over £106,000; a considerable amount of money at the time which was used to help WW1 veterans with employment and housing. The following year, Major George Howson set up the **Poppy Factory** to employ disabled ex-Servicemen. The demand for poppies in England was so high that few were reaching Scotland. Earl Haig's wife established the "Lady Haig Poppy Factory" in Edinburgh in 1926 to produce poppies exclusively for Scotland. Over 5 million Scottish poppies (*which have four petals and no leaf unlike poppies in the rest of the UK*) are still made by hand by disabled ex-Servicemen at Lady Haig's Poppy Factory each year and distributed by the charity **Poppyscotland**.

Dickson Kulisewa ... In 2012 I went to Nkhoma Hospital for a second time as locum for Dr David Morton, who was from the USA, but sent out by the Church of Scotland and Gordon Presbytery who were linked with Nkhoma Hospital through him.

Whilst in the hospital I was approached by a young man, Dickson Kulisewa, who at that time was a Clinical Medical Officer. (These folk do much of the doctoring in Malawi and have either only 2 or 3 years training). Dickson was very keen to go to medical school and have full training - his ambition to be a paediatrician. I discussed this with David Morton and Dr Reyneir TerHaar who were the medical doctor respectively at Nkhoma. They agreed it was worth pursing if I could raise the funds.

At this point Dickson informed me he had applied and had a place at Lusaka in Zambia as his school grades did not allow him entry to medical school in Malawi. So I agreed to find the funding for what originally was a 5 year course but became 7 years as time progressed.

Through friends, Presbytery, Anne Gloag's Foundation and myself we managed to fund his 7 years at university and he passed his final exams in August. He will do his internship *(like our very junior doctors)* in Lilongwe Malawi, then return to Nkhoma to give back the 7 years he had in training. I am sure the Lord had a hand in all this!

Having worked on the medical wards there and having very little Chichewa *(the local language)* and also having little insight into the culture, of which I picked up a little on my 2 visits, I felt it would be great if they could have another Malawian person who spoke the language and grew up in their culture to be their doctor. The Church of Scotland was at that time putting another young man through medical school in Tanzania from Nkhoma.

So Dickson went off to Lusaka and has kept in touch. He also became a father to 2 year old Vespers. He sends his blessings and thanks for allowing him to do this and funding his training.

Thanks to your congregation for their help and support over the last 7 years. I add my grateful thanks for enabling this to happen.

Postcards from WW1

If you like to browse in antique shops you may have come across the beautiful,

silk decorated postcards sent home by soldiers during WW1. It's a fascinating story. The cards were being made some time before WW1 when the nuns in Belgium and Northern France used local women as outworkers to embroider the designs in silk. It provided useful employment.



Move forward to the outbreak of WW1 when soldiers became aware of these



beautiful cards and wanted to send them home. The nuns could see their growing popularity, so the designs went on to include patriotic flags, messages to someone loved, a sister or mother, flowers etc. They were a very poignant link with home.

The postcards are blank and rely on the embroidery to convey the message. The surround

is embossed paper and glued to a frame to hold the central piece of silk. They were too fragile to send through the post so were enclosed with letters.
