

Dear Friends

As I am writing this, it is not yet the middle of July! (This news would shock our Saltire Editor, Diane, as she usually has to remind me to submit my monthly contribution so that printing can begin on time.) But, as my summer holiday falls in the last two weeks of July this year, I need to be 'super-on-time' to meet the deadline for this August issue.

The word 'holiday' comes from the Old English 'hāligdæg', meaning 'holy day'. It originally referred only to special days in the Christian

calendar when people stopped their daily work to concentrate on the Church celebration; Christmas Day and Easter being the most well-known. Over the years 'holiday' came to refer days when work stopped for a period of leisure. This became enshrined in law when the 1938 'Holidays with Pay Act' entitled all workers in the UK to one week's paid holiday per year. More recently, the term 'going on holiday' came into common use, and a week, or two, away from home became a regular highlight of many people's year.

It was while on a holiday to Lake Garda in the summer of 2019 that I became convinced that God was calling me to be your minister, here at St. Andrew's. Like everyone else then, I had no idea then how drastically things were about to change!

With the pandemic striking in 2020, going away on holiday became almost impossible for most of that year and, with all the uncertainty around COVID restrictions, and red, amber or green destinations, the thought of going away is still somewhat daunting today. So, the main change of scene I will have during my fortnight off, will be not entering the church, or the manse office, to work. But a holiday is more than just a change of location; more importantly it is a time to rest.

From the very beginning, God modelled the importance of resting, 'By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work. Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done.' (Genesis 2:2,3 NIV). Jesus knew the importance of taking time out: At the very start of His earthly ministry, He spent forty days and nights in the wilderness preparing Himself, and He continued to go to quiet places, spending time alone in prayer throughout His earthly mission. The Garden of Gethsemane, the night before His final ordeal, being the last example.

Taking time off work to rest is important if we want to follow the command and example of God. This applies to paid employment, voluntary work and work around the house. No matter what you work at, you need time to rest, not because, as Sam Keen (an American author, professor, and philosopher) wrote 'Deep summer is when laziness finds respectability', but because you will wear yourself out if you don't.

Godly rest comes both before and after hard work. I am looking forward to a restful two weeks then getting back to work. I pray that you, too, will find time to rest this summer, you deserve it, and God expects it.

News from the combined Congregational Board/Kirk Session Meeting held on Wednesday, 14th July 2021 at 7.00 pm in St Andrew's Church.

Key Points

- Mrs Rosie Milne was appointed as Session Clerk (see page 2). A Letter of Thanks to be sent to Ken Tuach for all his work during his time as Session Clerk.
- National Giving Day: This to coincide with the Harvest Thanksgiving Service.
- Livestream/AV Project Status: John Chapman and Peter Milne have now concluded their equipment assessments and work programme in respect of the £9,200 Adapt & Thrive Grant for the project. The equipment will be sourced locally wherever possible. This was all agreed by the Board. More information on the progress of this project to follow.
- Social Committee is in discussion with Derek Ritchie of the We R Inverurie regarding the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations next year, to avoid conflict of dates.
- Talks on the changes proposed under the new Presbytery Plan are ongoing with the West Church. Reported that Presbytery had now appointed a Building Officer.
- Covid 19—As of 19th July social distancing will go down to 1 metre, therefore numbers will increase in the Church, Chapel and Gallery.
- Mo Vernal has agreed to stay on meantime as the Playgroup Liaison coordinator.
- Agreed that a Letter of Thanks be sent to Jim Adie who helped Ralph Green tidy up the grounds around the Playgroup Hall. The Board duly thanked Ralph for all his hard work.

'On Holiday with Jesus'

August is the month when schools are off and many of us go on holiday. This year will be very different, with many opting for a 'staycation'! The good news is that Jesus offers us a true rest:

'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.' (Matthew 11: 28-29). Are you feeling tired or burdened and in need of a holiday? Jesus invites you to spend it with Him!

The Invitation: Our holiday destination is Jesus Himself: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened.' We can come just as we are, with all the burdens and sadness we carry from the last 18 months. Jesus doesn't offer a 'quick fix' to deal with our issues; He simply offers Himself!

The Promise: Jesus promises us the gift of refreshing, sustaining and everlasting rest. When we go on holiday, we usually look forward to doing very little and yet this is not the kind of rest Jesus offers. His rest involves taking up His yoke and learning from Him! A yoke was the wooden collar that ran across the shoulders of a pair of oxen to enable them to work the fields. Jesus says: 'My yokes fit well. They do not rub your neck and shoulders. Come to Me and get yoked to Me. Make an act of loyal obedience and trust in Me. And you will find a deep peace and satisfaction that you could never find anywhere else. I have come for you!'

What's so amazing about this holiday is that you can get rest by simply staying at home!

Climbing Ben Nevis ... The first recorded ascent of Ben Nevis was made 250 years ago, on 7th August 1771, by Scottish botanist and artist James Robertson. At 1345 metres (4411 ft), it is the highest mountain in the British Isles. Some 100,000 people now make the climb each year. Robertson wrote: "A third part of the hill from the summit towards the top is entirely naked, resembling a heap of stones thrown together confusedly. The summit far overtops the surrounding hills."

Hill climbing was not popular in those days, but the poet John Keats made the ascent in 1818. Scots were not convinced for many years that Ben Nevis was higher than Ben Macdui, in the Cairngorms, but it is in fact more than a hundred feet higher.

The meaning of the mountain's name is uncertain. Some associate it with the Gaelic word for "venomous", but it seems at least equally likely that "Nevis" relates to snow or clouds. It is in fact the remains of an ancient volcano that collapsed in on itself. Its summit plateau stretches for over 100 acres and contains the remains of an observatory, which was opened in 1883 and led indirectly to the invention of the cloud chamber.

This is the first church social event since the original lockdown in March 2020 and everyone on the Social Committee is looking forward to welcoming past supporters and new friends. It will certainly be a very happy and funfilled occasion - something we all need after such a tough 18 months.

Yet Another Grand Day Out!!

Having travelled to the Standing Stones at Loanhead of Daviot in June, I thought we should do something different for August. Huntly Castle is only 40 minutes from



Inverurie. The castle is a magnificent ruin, famous for both the quality of its architecture and for its eventful history. Its beautiful setting is in the green heart of Aberdeenshire countryside.

The Earls of Fife built the original castle, the Peel of Strathbogie, around 1190, to guard the crossing point where the Rivers Bogie and Deveron meet. However, the Fifes of Strathbogie lost their lands and titles in 1314 after backing the losing side at the Battle of Bannockburn. (Kit says—

Oh dear! What a blunder!) The victorious Robert the Bruce granted Strathbogie to a loyal supporter, Sir Adam Gordon of Huntly. Around 1445, Alexander, 2nd Lord Gordon, was created Earl of Huntly and the Gordons went from strength to



strength until NE Scotland became known as "Gordon country." During the turbulent times of the 15th century, battles raged amongst Scotland's leading families and Huntly Castle suffered considerable damage. Towards the latter part of the 15th century, reconstruction was begun inspiration being taken from Suscinio Castle in Brittany which closely resembles the design of Huntly Castle.

The Reformation in 1560 saw many changes in Scotland but George Gordon, Fourth Earl of Huntly, remained a devout Catholic and continued to hear Mass despite its ban by the Reformation Act. In 1562 a Royal army was sent north to deal with the



Earl and, following a brief battle at Corrichie, he was captured and died shortly afterwards. The Scottish Government decided to go ahead with the trial and did so by embalming the Earl's corpse and charging it with treason! A guilty verdict was returned, and, when the late Earl's home was raided, a spectacular hoard of riches was discovered, including the treasures of Aberdeen RC Cathedral which had been sent to Huntly Castle for safe-keeping as the Reformation got underway.

More disruption followed between the Fifth and Sixth Earls of Huntly and King James V1, until the Sixth Earl was finally reconciled with the King in 1597 and given the title Marquis of Huntly. To mark his new found status the Marquis substantially enhanced the appearance of the castle. The final rebuilding of Huntly Castle was undertaken by the Second Marquis of Huntly but his work was never completed as he became involved in the 17th century Civil War - (unfortunately for him) supporting Charles 1. The Marquis in 1649 was arrested, tried and executed by the Covenanters. Further damage inflicted during the Civil War contributed to the general impairment of the castle. It was, however, sufficiently intact to be used as a garrison for Government troops during the 1745 Jacobite Rebellion but thereafter it drifted into ruin. In 1923 it was gifted to the State by the Duke of Richmond and Gordon and is now looked after by Historic Scotland.
