Our Minister's Letter

Dear Friends

November is here already! The year, as they say, is fair flying in and Advent will begin on the last Sunday of this month, marking the start of the new church year.

The word 'Advent' is derived from the Latin word 'adventus', which means 'coming', and is a translation of the Greek word 'parousia'. While 'parousia' also means 'coming', it specifically refers to the Second Coming, when Jesus will return in Glory and, as such, is an event we may live our whole lives waiting for. But Advent, the four Sundays before Christmas, is a yearly event, during which we eagerly anticipate celebrating the birth of our Saviour, in a

Bethlehem stable, just over two thousand years ago.

Historical evidence reveals that Advent was first celebrated in churches in Spain and Gaul (now France) during the 4th and 5th centuries. It was seen as a season for the preparation of new Christians for baptism on the feast day of Epiphany on January 6. (Epiphany being the celebration of the Wise Men bringing their gifts to Jesus.) The existing Christians used this time in the same way as they used Lent, in penance, prayer, and fasting, to prepare for these Epiphany baptisms - there was very little connection between Advent and Christmas.

Moving on to the 6th century, Roman Christians linked Advent to the coming of Christ, but not the Christ-child at Christmas, rather, in keeping with the meaning of the Greek, 'parousia', His second coming in Glory. It was not until the Middle Ages that the Advent season was explicitly linked to the celebration of Christ's birth.

Today, the season of Advent covers the last four Sundays before Christmas Day. Because of the way our calendar works, the first Sunday of Advent will always be between November 27 and December 3 inclusive. Many churches light candles on an Advent Wreath each Sunday, marking the countdown to Christmas. These candles are given various names, which link to the Scripture readings on each of the four Sundays. Here in St. Andrew's, the first candle symbolises Hope, the second Peace, the third Joy and the fourth Love. At the Christmas Eve service, immediately after midnight, the larger, central candle in the Advent Wreath is lit. This is the Christ candle, and its lighting symbolises the light of Jesus coming into the world.

During Advent, we follow the events that culminated in the fulfilment of the prophecy in Isaiah, 'For a Child has been born to us, a Son is given to us; He will bear the symbol of dominion on His shoulder, and His title will be: Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty Hero, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah 9:6) In keeping this promise, God enacted His plan to restore the relationship, broken in the Garden of Eden, between Him and us.

The birth of Jesus, His life, death and resurrection marked the beginning of this Age. As we enjoy the growing anticipation of the Advent season, let's also remember that we are still waiting for the 'parousia', the Second Coming, when Jesus will return in Glory and the joy of Christmas will be infinitely magnified for His people.

As we enter the season of Advent, help us to keep our gaze firmly fixed on Him. Help us to see through the sparkle of glitter, tinsel and baubles to the glory that shone from a



dirty stable. Help us to take time out from the busyness of card-writing, giftgiving and tree-decorating, to spend time in Your Word. Above all, help us to remember that Jesus came for a purpose and left us with a mission – guide and strengthen us to fulfil our part in His mission and spread the Gospel.

Lest We Forget

'In Flanders' fields the poppies blow between the crosses, row on row, that mark our place: and in the sky the larks, still bravely singing, fly scarce heard amid the guns below.'

This is the first verse of John McCrae's poem, first published in Punch magazine in 1915. It soon came to symbolise the sacrifice of all who died in World War One. Today, the poppy remains a tangible symbol for those who have sacrificed their lives in war, especially as we remember those who died in Afghanistan. But why do we remember?

'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.' (Micah 4:3).

Writing 700 years before Christ, Micah spoke at the time when Samaria fell due to the aggression of Assyria. However, he prophesied a future of hope, a world where nations come together in peace rather than war. His words are fulfilled in the kingdom of God established by Jesus.

Our understanding of *peace* is more than simply the absence of conflict. It about building relationships is between people, communities and nations, founded on love and justice for all. As we remember those who died in war, we should look practically at how we can build such relationships, beginning with our own families, colleagues and neighbours. 'We will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever.' (Micah 4:5). Let's ask God's Spirit to make us people of peace, justice and compassion for today's world.

'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

As we enter the final few weeks before COP26, the global climate change conference taking place in Glasgow (31^{st} October – 12^{th} November), we are writing to encourage every congregation in the Church of Scotland to do all that we can do to ensure that this gathering succeeds in addressing the huge challenges that we are facing.

A call to prayer and worship

Our first message to you is to encourage our congregations to pray; in our worship and preaching in the Sundays leading up to and during COP26, and to join the many opportunities for in-person and online worship that are now being planned, across Glasgow and elsewhere. We would also ask that you will consider arranging local events where people can come together to pray for justice for the poorest and for our planet. Let us pray for our leaders involved in momentous decisions; for those whose lives are most blighted by climate injustice; and for the earth which is part of God's beautiful creation. Please also remember in your prayers all those working on behalf of our Church in relation to COP26, including a chaplaincy provision offered through Glasgow Cathedral, open to any who would value an opportunity to reflect in a safe and sacred space, and those involved in arranging a special COP26 ecumenical service to be held on Sunday 7 November at Glasgow Cathedral, which will be live-streamed. Resources for prayer, preaching and worship on the theme of climate change and safeguarding the integrity of creation are available from <u>Eco-Congregation Scotland</u> and Churches Together in Britain and Ireland's <u>'Climate Sunday'</u> website.

Let us together pray and strive to be a church that acts as if we believe that God made the earth in all its wonder.

30 November - Andrew (d. c.60)

– patron saint of Scotland ... The apostle Andrew is patron saint of Scotland. According to the gospel of Matthew, Andrew and his brother Simon Peter were the very first two disciples whom Jesus called. 'Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.' (Matt 4:18,19)



Without more ado, they obeyed. 'At once they left their nets and followed him.' The story is touching for the simple but total faith that they had in Jesus.

Whenever the gospels mention the disciples, Andrew's name is always in the first four. Rather than a boisterous leader of men (like Peter), he seems to have been an approachable person who wanted to help people.

It was Andrew who helped introduce a group of Greeks to Jesus (John 12:20-2) and Andrew who offered Jesus the five small barley loaves and two small fishes when Jesus challenged them to feed the five thousand. (John 6:8) His faith in Jesus over small things was richly rewarded, and

this faithful, kindly Galilean fisherman turned disciple went on to become one of the 12 apostles of the Christian Church. Andrew never settled back in Capernaum by Galilee. Instead, his 'fishing for men' seems to have taken him far. One ancient tradition links him with Greece, where both Scythia and Epirus claimed him as their apostle. Another place in Greece, Patras in Achaia, claimed to be the place where Andrew was eventually martyred.

Like Jesus, he was crucified, but the story goes that during the two days it took him to die, he preached earnestly to the people about Jesus. Andrew was not afraid of death on a cross – he had seen it before, and knew one thing for certain: because of Jesus, there was nothing but eternal life ahead of him. In the West, Andrew's feast-day was universal from the 6th century, and hundreds of churches were named after him in Italy, France and England. But how did he end up as patron saint of Scotland?

Well, according to one ancient legend, his relics were taken from Patras to Scotland in the 8th century, and ended up in Fife, where a church dedicated to him was built and became a centre for evangelisation and later pilgrimage. As Andrew was the only apostle to make it as far as Scotland, he was chosen as patron saint. But Andrew did not stay in Scotland. After the fall of Constantinople in 1204, it is said that the Crusaders took his relics to Amalfi. From there the despot Thomas Palaeologus sent his head to the pope in Rome in 1461 – where it became one of the most treasured possessions of St Peter's - until it was sent to the church in Constantinople by Paul VI.

In art, Andrew is depicted with a normal Latin cross in the most ancient examples. The saltire cross 'X', commonly called St Andrew's Cross, and which represents Scotland on the Union Jack, was associated with him from the 10th century.

Tribute to Aly Bonnyman

Aly was born on 15th April, 1932, at Wellwood Cottage, Cults. He attended



Cults Public School until 1939. The family then moved to Inverurie when his father was appointed Head Gardener at the Hospital. Aly attended Market Place Primary and then Inverurie Academy. Just before starting his National Service, Aly met Joyce and they had a secret courtship, eventually meeting up again once his time in the Forces was served. They were married in the South Church by the Rev Inglis Black on 27th August, 1955. Sandra was born in 1957 and Raymond followed in 1959. Aly and Joyce enjoyed many holidays at home and abroad over the years.

His church connection began when he joined the Sunday School at St Andrew's, which was known as the South Church at that time. When the

Rev I M Black was appointed Minister, Aly became friends with George his son, who was the same age as Aly. In Aly's words "the two of us got up to all sorts of mischief", one of which was ringing the Church Bell in March 1943, resulting in the Home Guard being called out. Neither Aly nor George were able to sit for a week!!!

Aly was ordained as an Elder in 1973 by the Rev Jim Davidson. Aly carried out his Elder's duties diligently as well as many other voluntary tasks. The old sound system was downstairs at the back of the Church where there was very little room. When the new sound system was installed upstairs Aly, others and myself who were on the Rota, quickly learned to operate the updated equipment. Aly and I shared beadle duties for many years at weddings and funerals and worked well together. Aly enjoyed the ceremonial events under the Rev Graeme Longmuir when he proudly led the dignitaries down the centre aisle wearing the beadle's robe and carrying the mace. For many years Aly looked after The Grubb Trust Fund along with several others. On the social side of St Andrew's, Aly was an excellent MC and when in charge of selling raffle tickets at Church events he had a friendly word for one and all. For many years he was Santa at the Playgroup Christmas parties.

Outwith the Church, Aly was a member of The Garioch Probus Club for many years and at one time was President. I followed him and Aly typically 'kept me right'. Aly was also a keen golfer and member of the local Pipe Band. Aly will be remembered as a cheery, kind person who had a word for everyone and will be sadly missed. Our thoughts are with his family at this time.

St Andrew's Safeguardimg Statement

(Relating to the Protection of Children and Young People in the Church. Adopted by the General Assembly, May 1997.)

The Church of Scotland has a deep concern for the wholeness and well-being of each individual. I seeks to safeguard the welfare of all people, regardless of age, who come into contact with the church and its organisations. It is the responsibility of each individual within the fellowship of the church to prevent the physical, sexual or emotional abuse of children and young people and the vulnerable. St Andrew's Parish Church has a Zero Tolerance Policy to any form of abuse.
