Our Minister's Letter

Dear Friends

December is upon us already! After another year dominated by the global pandemic, the chance to pause and contemplate the single greatest event in the history of the world is very welcome. When we think about the Nativity in the Bible, we mostly think of two accounts; the first in Matthew and the second in Luke:

Matthew begins his Gospel with the genealogy of Jesus, tracing His ancestry right back to Abraham. Confirming, for his mainly Jewish audience, that Jesus was a Jew. Matthew then recounts how both Mary and Joseph received the news before simply stating, 'Jesus was born at Bethlehem in Judea during the time of

King Herod.' (Matthew 2:1a) Matthew concludes his nativity account with the visit of the Magi, the massacre of the innocents and the flight to, and return from, Egypt. Throughout, Matthew relates the events to prophecies from the Old Testament.

Luke's account goes into more detail. Beginning with the miracles surrounding the birth of John the Baptist, Jesus' cousin, before recounting the events familiar from countless Nativity plays: angelic visits, census, journey to Bethlehem, no room at the inn, stable, manger, shepherds and the presentation of Jesus in the Temple.

This is the Christmas story we remember every year. But there is greater element, only really clear in John's Gospel: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.' (John 1:1-3) John then recounts the Nativity in half a verse, 'The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.' (John 1:14a) The Word is, of course, Jesus.


If we turn back to the very beginning of the Bible, to the account of creation in Genesis 1, we see how God spoke the universe into being. Each creative act is introduced with the words, 'And God said,' and concludes, 'and there was'. Notice, God **spoke** creation into being, He used the power of His **Word**, the same Word that 'became flesh and made His dwelling among us', Jesus!

Jesus did not start as a baby in a manger, He has always been, He is the creative force responsible for all existence, an integral part of the Triune God. From the moment Adam and Eve were banished from Eden, God worked on bringing us back to Him. The Bible relates the unfolding of His plan, beginning with God's covenant with Abraham and the growth of his family into a nation, continuing with the rescue from Egypt and entry into the Promised Land, and culminating with Jesus' death and resurrection. Through Moses, God rescued the Israelites from slavery to the Egyptians. Through Jesus, He rescues us from the much greater slavery to sin.

Jesus' birth marked the beginning of the final stage of God's plan, a stage that will only be complete when Jesus returns. As we celebrate this Christmas, let's pause to remember the enormity of God's Plan to bring us back to him.

Loving God,

As we pause to celebrate the wonderous birth in Bethlehem, we thank You for Your care. We thank You that You do not turn from us the way we turn from You, that You did not allow the defiance of Adam and Eve to be the end of the relationship between You and humanity, instead, You implemented the most marvellous plan of reconciliation, enacted over millennia, establishing Your covenant



first with one man, then a whole nation and finally, through Jesus, the whole world.

Lord Jesus, as You were born in poverty, help us to show compassion to the poor. As You cured the sick, help us to show care for those who are unwell. As You reached out to outcasts, help us to do what we can for refugees and the homeless. As You demonstrated love in so many ways, help us to echo Your example, so that this Christmas brings joy into lives that are in need.

25th December: The history of Christmas

The Bible does not give a date for the birth of Jesus. In the third century it was suggested that

Jesus was conceived at the Spring equinox, 25^{th} March, popularising the belief that He was born nine months later on 25^{th} December. John Chrysostom, the Archbishop of Constantinople, encouraged Christians worldwide to make Christmas a holy day in about 400.



In the early Middle Ages, Christians celebrated a series of midwinter holy days. Epiphany (which recalls the visit to the infant Jesus of the wise men bearing gifts) was the climax of 12 days of Christmas, beginning on 25th December. Emperor Charlemagne chose 25th December for his coronation in 800, and the prominence of Christmas Day rose. In England, William the Conqueror also chose 25^{th} December for his coronation in 1066, and the date became a fixture both for religious observance and feasting. Cooking a boar was a common feature of mediaeval Christmas feasts, and singing carols accompanied it. Writers of the time lament the fact that the true significance of Christmas was being lost because of partying. They condemn the rise of 'misrule' - drunken dancing and promiscuity. The day was a public holiday, and traditions of bringing evergreen foliage into the house and the exchange of gifts (usually on Epiphany) date from this time.

In the 17th century the rise of new Protestant denominations led to a rejection of many celebrations that were associated with Catholic Christianity. Christmas was one of them. After the execution of Charles I, England's Puritan rulers

made the celebration of Christmas illegal for 14 years. The restoration of Charles II ended the ban, but religious leaders continued to discourage excess, especially in Scotland. In Western Europe (but not worldwide) the day for exchanging gifts changed from Epiphany (6th January) to Christmas Day. By the 1820s, there was a sense that the significance of Christmas was declining. Charles Dickens was one of several writers who sought to restore it. His novel A Christmas Carol was significant in reviving merriment during the festival. He emphasised charity and family reunions, alongside religious observance. Christmas trees, paper chains, cards and many well-known carols date from this time. So did the tradition of Boxing Day, on 26th December, when tradesmen who had given reliable service during the year would collect 'boxes' of money or gifts from their customers.

In Europe Santa Claus is the figure associated with the bringing of gifts. Santa Claus is a shortening of the name of Saint Nicholas, who was a Christian bishop in the fourth century in present-day Turkey. He was particularly noted for his care for children and for his generosity to the poor. By the Middle Ages his appearance, in red bishop's robes and a mitre, was adored in the Netherlands and familiar across Europe. Father Christmas dates from 17th century England, where he was a secular figure of good cheer (more associated with drunkenness than gifts). The transformation of Santa Claus into today's Father Christmas started in New York in the 1880s, where his red robes and beard became potent advertising symbols. In some countries (such as Latin America and Eastern Europe) the tradition attempts to combine the secular and religious elements by holding that Santa Claus makes children's presents and then gives them to the baby Jesus to distribute.
