Our Minister's Letter



Dear Friends

I don't suppose many people who would open a bag of flour, or sugar, would eat the contents with a spoon. Similarly, I don't suppose many people would eat a block of butter, or a raw egg. But, when you mix flour, sugar, butter and egg in just the right quantities, and cook the mixture for a certain time, they produce a cake, which many people would be delighted to eat.

Almost everything in our lives is made up of more than one thing; a book is made of paper, glue and ink, the sofa you are probably sitting on right now is made of wood, metal, material, stuffing and so on, while the computer I am using to write this is made up of more things than I know. Like cake ingredients, the things that go

to make up something become so much more as part of the whole, than they were in their natural state.

St. Andrew's Church is made up of many things, the most important of which are the people. There are many people, who work in many different ways, to help our church run smoothly, keep the buildings and their contents in good order, and help us pay the bills. Some of the work done is obvious, such as the volunteers on duty welcoming people on a Sunday, or Linsey, in the office, happy to set aside a task to help whoever comes in, or myself, leading worship from the front of the church on Sundays. Some of the work done is less obvious, but would soon be noticed if it were not done; such as the cleaning of the church, or the flowers being arranged to such stunning effect, or the operation of the screens and sound system during worship. Still other work may take longer to be noticed if it were not done, such as the regular maintenance of the building, the financial administration, the planning and implementation of duty rotas, social events, or the production and delivery of the magazine you are reading. These are just some examples of the work that goes on to ensure that St. Andrew's Church is able to fulfil its mission and, in the true spirit of Christian service, it is mostly done by volunteers with no expectation of reward.

If a baker forgot to put just one of the four main ingredients into the mixture, the result would not be a delicious cake. In the same way, each and every job done by volunteers in our Church is as important as any other, and our whole mission would be the poorer if any task was left undone.

As St. Paul wrote, 'There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are varieties of service, but the same Lord. There are varieties of activity, but in all of them and in everyone the same God is active.' (1 Corinthians 12:4-6)

Therefore, on behalf of all the members of St. Andrew's Church, I am delighted to say a huge 'THANK YOU' to all who work so hard in support of our mission throughout the year. Your selfless service is very much appreciated.

The World Ahead

Towards the end of every year *The Economist* publishes a comprehensive paperback looking at the year to come. For



2022. The World Ahead looks at 10 main issues, and while course of these reflect а commercial and financial viewpoint, they are also areas of concern to

Christians also. They are:

1) *Democracy v autocracy* – the tensions between the rival political systems of America and China will continue to involve trade, tech regulations, vaccinations, and space stations.

2) Pandemic to endemic – new treatments are coming, but unless more people can be vaccinated globally, Covid-19 will become yet another endemic disease, affecting the poor more than the rich.

3) *Inflation worries* – the supply-chain interruptions and increased energy demands have pushed up prices. Will that affect charity and church finances? The UK also has an acute labour shortage.

4) The future of work – the work-fromhome syndrome will probably mean more 'hybrid' workstations. Women are keener to work from home. Could this impact church life, and, if so, in what ways?

5) *The new techlash* – American and European governments have been trying to rein in the tech giants. Meanwhile, China is demanding they focus on geostrategic advantage, not "frivolities like games and shopping."

6) *Crypto grows up* – the new cryptocurrencies are being domesticated. Where will the future standard of finance fall? The central banks or somewhere else? It is still to be determined. Such issues may affect the Church Commissioners, but probably not the local church!

7) *Climate crunch* – this affects us all but still "a striking lack of urgency prevails among policymakers." And global success, if it can be achieved, will require co-operation between the West and China.

8) *Travel trouble* – the transition to an endemic from a zero-Covid suppression (as in Australasia) may be difficult. Future business travel is likely to be much less (zoom taking over), so holiday travel could cost more. What will this mean for international Christian gatherings?

9) Space races – "2022 will be the first year in which more people go into space as paying passengers than government employees." China will finish its new space station; NASA is crashing a probe into an asteroid.

10) *Political footballs* – the Beijing Winter Olympics and the football World Cup in Qatar will show just how far sport can bring nations together.

Such is the global perspective, as seen by economists. What difference would Christian leaders bring to the table? Church planting would be an obvious candidate, but there is encourage dispirited also а need to Christian people, to strengthen and empower youth work, to decide the best way forward for congregations whose churches are no longer viable, to develop a vision to national spiritual need, to enable meet leadership to focus on the top priorities without distraction on lesser things, and finally, to revitalise faith in the inspiration, authority and power of God's Word.

The recent death of Archbishop Desmond Tutu was mourned around the world. Here are six of his more famous quotes, which show why he was so especially honoured for his justice and reconciliation work in South Africa.

- "Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world."
- "If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality."

- "Don't raise your voice, improve your argument. Good sense does not always lie with the loudest shouters, nor can we say that a large, unruly crowd is always the best arbiter of what is right."

Knitting for Malawi

... This picture shows our garage with 48

banana boxes, plus some suitcases, full of knitting ready to be delivered to a store in Dundee and subsequently shipped to Nkomo Hospital in Malawi. (These boxes are transported twice a year in a large container.) For some years now Hamish and I



have been the coordinators for Gordon Presbytery for the Banana Box Trust, sometimes known as knitting for the "Fish & Chip Babies" because they were sent home wrapped in newspaper. The journey is long and slow, taking 6 months at a cost of £15.00 per box payable by each church to Gordon Presbytery. When they reach Nkomo Hospital the items are distributed throughout Malawi. Boxes are gathered in from Presbyteries all over Scotland. For anyone who is interested in

this venture, the items required are - Vests, Hats, Blankets & Dolls/Teddies, all knitted. Items such as walking sticks & crutches are also welcome. Patterns can be obtained from the church or from me. Tel. No. 01467 628778 or on email at <u>ecosse31@tiscali.co.uk</u>.

Alpacas pack a lot of FUN! ... Wondering what to

do with the children/grandchildren during mid term - or even the Easter holidays? Here's a suggestion which will put big smiles on small (and not so small!) faces.



Highland Alpacas is a farm just outside Balmedie run by Imants and Mabel Schneider. There are 49 alpacas and a visit to see these gorgeous creatures is a delight. Last October, when our grandsons from Sussex came to stay with us for their mid term, Tom and I decided to take Ben and Max to see this unusual farm. Booking is essential and only one family at a time is permitted. This ensures a very personal experience and Mabel, our guide, could not have been more welcoming.

We arrived in the early afternoon and were given basins of food to feed the boy alpacas. This was fun as they jostled our arms and hands to see which one could get the most food for themselves. Mabel gave us some interesting information about alpacas and the difference between them and llamas. Both species are originally from Peru in South America, but alpacas are smaller and fluffier and bred for their fleece rather than as beasts of burden. The alpaca fleece is finer and denser, whereas the llama fleece is coarser

and is considered inferior. Alpacas have short, spear shaped ears while llamas have more elongated faces with bigger, banana shaped ears. Llamas also tend to be more aggressive.

After feeding the "boys" we set out to see the "girls" by way of a field where we saw more alpacas and also Bertie, an elderly Kunekune pig. Bertie was friendly but michty me! he wisnae bonnie!!! Leaving Bertie behind, we made our way to the "girls" shed where they were eating lunch, or maybe it was afternoon tea! They were all so willing to be petted and even kissed! Once they had

eaten their hay, they lay down for extra cuddles much to the





delight of our boys. Even my Tom got an extra big cuddle from the captivating Cleopatra! (Each alpaca has his/her own name.)

We were joined by Mabel's husband, Imants, and they told us so many fascinating facts about their dearly loved animals and how they began their unusual venture. Mabel and Imants have lived at Pettens' Croft since 1986 but it was not until 2003 that they got involved with alpacas when they invested in a shipment of top quality alpacas from Peru and soon had a "starter" herd of three pregnant females. St Andrew's Safeguardimg Statement

(Relating to the Protection of Children and Young People in the Church. Adopted by the General Assembly, May 1997.)

The Church of Scotland has a deep concern for the wholeness and well-being of each individual. I seeks to safeguard the welfare of all people, regardless of age, who come into contact with the church and its organisations. It is the responsibility of each individual within the fellowship of the church to prevent the physical, sexual or emotional abuse of children and young people and the vulnerable. St Andrew's Parish Church has a Zero Tolerance Policy to any form of abuse.
