Our Minister's Letter



Dear Friends

Easter week takes us on a profound emotional journey. Starting with the high of Palm Sunday, as Jesus was welcomed by ecstatic crowds: cheering, waving palm branches and throwing down cloaks for His donkey to walk over. Even the complaints of the Jewish leaders, and their demands for Jesus to stop the crowds from praising Him, couldn't dampen the mood. Jesus told them, 'I tell you, if my disciples are silent the stones will shout aloud.' (Luke 19:40)

Next comes the shocking spectacle of Jesus overturning the tables of the money changers in the temple, telling them, 'Scripture says,

"My house shall be a house of prayer"; but you have made it a

bandits cave.' (Luke 19:46)

Then, the intensely personal 'Last Supper', with Jesus washing His disciples' feet saying, 'Then if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet.' (John 13:14) Teaching that the Christian way is service.

The low point of the week arrives with Judas betraying Jesus, His arrest, show trial, sentence, flogging and crucifixion, all while His disciples abandoned Him to His fate, hiding in fear for their lives. The sadness as Jesus' broken body is laid in a borrowed tomb is overwhelming.

Then comes the joy of Easter morning and the empty tomb - He has Risen!

For nearly six weeks after, Jesus appeared to His disciples and 'spoke to them about the kingdom of God.' (Acts 1:3b) We are not directly told what He taught, but it is unlikely that He taught them anything new. He probably began in the same way He taught the two disciples walking to Emmaus: 'Then, starting from Moses and all the prophets, He explained to them in the whole of scripture the things that referred to Himself.' (Luke 24:27) Just like He used to explain His parables, Jesus probably used this time to explain the meaning of all that He had said and done. This would fit with Luke writing, 'I gave an account (in His Gospel) of all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day He was taken up into heaven.' (Acts 1:1), as nothing new was added after the events of his Gospel.

The time of learning came to an end after forty days when Jesus 'was lifted up before their very eyes, and a cloud took Him from their sight.' (Acts 1:9) This is 'The Ascension', celebrated, this year, on the last Sunday in May.

Throughout this time we see the full range of human emotions and behaviours on display. The disciples experienced a rollercoaster of joy, puzzlement, fear, despair, wonder, anger, and almost every other emotion you could name. Why? Because they were ordinary people, like you and me. They were caught up in events beyond their control and, by the grace of God, they came through the other side with their failures forgiven and forgotten. That is also reality for each of us. We will not always do, say or even think the right thing, but by the grace of God, we too are forgiven, and our sins forgotten. Our future with God is secure. Praise the Lord!

War in Ukraine : John Rutter, the composer, has written a new choral work in response to the invasion of Ukraine. Funds raised from 'A Prayer for Ukraine', are go-



ing to the Disasters Emergency Committee's Ukraine appeal.

Rutter explained: "How can a composer respond to a global tragedy? I suppose by writing music: like everybody I have been shocked and dismayed by the events of recent days. "The first thing I wanted to do was write

music that would respond in my own way. I went to a late-night service in my old college chapel where they sang a setting of a lovely Ukrainian prayer, so having encountered the Ukrainian text, on Thursday I wrote my own music. I hope the meaning of the text will resonate in people's hearts." The words of the piece, which are originally in Ukrainian, translate into English as: "Good Lord protect the Ukraine. Give her strength, courage, faith, and hope. Amen." He added: "I hope it speaks in terms which reach out to the Ukrainian people in their hour of need."

The score is available for free by <u>submitting</u> <u>this form</u>. You are welcome to duplicate the score for the sole use of your own choir. You may like to make a donation to a Ukrainian relief charity, perhaps equivalent to the approximate cost of the copies had you purchased them. If you wish, you are free to make an audio or video recording of the piece without a special licence to do so.

St Andrew's Safeguardimg Statement

(Relating to the Protection of Children and Young People in the Church. Adopted by the General Assembly, May 1997.)

The Church of Scotland has a deep concern for the wholeness and well-being of each individual. I seeks to safeguard the welfare of all people, regardless of age, who come into contact with the church and its organisations. It is the responsibility of each individual within the fellowship of the church to prevent the physical, sexual or emotional abuse of children and young people and the vulnerable. St Andrew's Parish Church has a Zero Tolerance Policy to any form of abuse.
